Multi-role storytelling relates a woman's journey to find her father in Pakistan, her travels through his land and discovery that she is taboo in a culture to which she longs to belong. Despite seemingly insurmountable challenges, love eventually prevails.

When Mountains Meet premiered to sell-out houses at Celtic Connections festival in Glasgow, January 2023.

Audience Experience

When Mountains Meet offers audiences an immersive experience that stimulates all the senses. It is richly visual, musically complex, tactile and tasty.

More like being invited to a party or a wedding than a show, audiences are welcomed by the cast, seated cabaret-style, meanwhile the band are on stage, improvising and warming up. During the performance, the audience are invited to make paper aeroplanes, to conjure memories while holding ancient stones from the Scottish Highlands, are served speciality kahwa tea and South-Asian sweets and encouraged to sit back and enjoy vivid swirling visuals projected onto the 'mountains' of the set.



Drawing on the tradition of generous Pakistani hospitality, audiences experience a warm, intimate, almost village-hall style friendliness, while simultaneously being offered first-class entertainment.

More about the Music



The music is composed by violinist Anne Wood, whose personal story is at the heart of the show. Classically trained at the Royal Academy of Music, Anne later studied Ethnomusicology at SOAS and continues to train in sarangi and Hindustani vocal technique. Anne has previously written music for theatre including Liz Lochead's Mary Queen of Scots Got Her Head Chopped Off (Lyceum Edinburgh). The band consists of Anne on violin, sarangi and tambura, Mary Macmaster on electroharp and vocals, Rick Wilson on percussion, including chenda and tamboor-style drums, and Rakae Jamil on sitar. Conceived by Anne as a conversation between Scottish and South-Asian

music, it combines alap, raag, reel and strathspey, as well as English, Gaelic and Hindustani vocals. You can hear some of the tracks here.

The associated wraparound activity is a hybrid live/online engagement event led by our Cultural Consultant, Mashal Peerzada of Yellow Brick Creative Development, Lahore, Pakistan.

Using the theme of Father/Daughter relationships, female participants are invited use a range of exercises and experiences to consider their own relationships. At the end of the workshop, they are invited to write an unsent letter. It is especially applicable to venues wishing to engage South-Asian communities directly and meaningfully.
